1. **Health Care/Social Issues:** Including issues about Seniors, quality daycare, mental illness, parenting education, growing obesity in the population and need for volunteerism.
2. **Economic Development:** Includes need to attract business and industry to the region and create a better-skilled labor pool for potential and existing employers.
3. **Economy (tied with #4):** Includes need for affordable housing/jobs, lower taxes and concern about businesses closing and layoffs.
4. **Local Government/Community Concerns:** Includes need for community pride, accountability of local governments and taxation.
5. **Infrastructure:** Includes repair of streets and potholes, improving existing infrastructure and keeping the airport open. Cleaning up communities.
6. **Crime Prevention/Violence/Gangs:** Concerns about crime, substance abuse and the economic strain caused by rising crime.
7. **Need for Recreations and Cultural Activities/especially for Young People**
8. **Minority/Ethnic Concerns:** Includes the need to bring diverse populations together to create better relationships within communities and concerns over illegal immigration.

In addition to the "Franchise" reports listed above, we reported many stories in each newscast which related to Problems and Needs on our list. Listed below are topics of just some of those stories, organized according to the Problem and Need which was addressed.

1. Health Care/Social Services

10/22 Friday, the Sioux City Lions Club helped take pictures as part of Iowa's Kids Sight program. The program helps to find vision problems in young children. The screening is for kids six months to four years old and looks for things like "lazy eye," near or far-sightedness and even cataracts.

11/10 Each year millions of Americans use a program called Flex Savings and it helps pay for medical expenses and avoid taxes. Users put aside up to \$5,000 dollars, tax free, for any medical costs and pay those costs back over time in small increments taken out of their paychecks. But the new Healthcare Reform bill the program will not cover "over the counter" and in January 2013 the maximum \$5,000 dollars you can put aside for the plan, will be cut in half to \$2,500.

12/01 It not easy finding a job in today's economy, but having a physical or mental disability it can be even harder. Goodwill in Sioux City, IA, is hoping to change that by offering job training at Goodwill University, a program set up to teach anyone new job skills, with janitorial or forklift training to choose from.

12/28 Tuesday the Iowa Department of Human Services named Jason Smith as the superintendent of Cherokee Mental Health Institute and the Civil Commitment Unit for Sexual Offenders. The former administrator Dan Gillette resigned last fall to pursue other interests.

2. Economic Development:

10/12 A big piece of funding for Sioux City's new water treatment plant project near Southbridge, came from an 8-million-dollar I-Jobs grant. The grant was part of the state's I-Jobs Water Quality Financial Assistance Program.

10/18 Monday, L&M Radiator broke ground and announced they'll be expanding their current operation in Yankton, SD. L&M has only operated in Yankton since 2006; but it already has the company's largest manufacturing space. Plans are to add staff and double their current manufacturing space. The company is based out of Minnesota, and has factories like Yankton's, around the world.

10/19 A proposed industrial park in Woodbury County is drawing some criticism despite support from county officials. In a letter sent to the county two months ago, Sioux City leaders asked the Woodbury County Board of Supervisors 23 questions about the proposed project and say they won't be supporting the Liberty Industrial Park project until those questions are answered.

10/20 In September it was announced that North American Co-Pack, a pork processing company out of Green Bay, Wisconsin was looking at creating a 1-point-7 million dollar processing facility in Le Mars, IA. On Wednesday, the company's C-F-O Bret Peterson confirmed that the plant will set up shop inside Nor-Am Cold Storage in Le Mars and that the facility could be up and running by the end of the year.

10/27 Saint Luke's Regional Medical Center is expanding its services with a new outpatient campus. Officials say this expansion comes as the need for more outpatient services

continues to increase. The new facility will be located in the Sunnybrook Drive connection in Morningside. The campus will be done in two stages throughout the next few years.

10/29 On Friday, folks in Orange City, IA, gathered to celebrate the latest town project. The newest project; construction on a 4-point-2 million dollar event center, that will be designed to be multifaceted, allowing for an outdoor celebration area that will be able to accommodate a number of events, including cultural, corporate activities, and weddings.

11/12 To help Side Dump Industries expand its international sales and create 10 jobs, South Sioux City will request 305 thousand dollars from the Nebraska Department of Economic Development for a Community Block grant. If approved, 300 thousand will be loaned to the company and the remaining funds will be used for administrative expenses associated with the grant.

11/18 South Sioux City's Absolute Screen Art is a family-owned business that specializes in shirt design and printing. Since things started 13 years ago, the business has undergone gradual growth. But in the last year, Screen Art has added four employees along with an automatic printing machine and the co-owner of the store says that even more additions are needed to keep up with future customer demand.

11/22 A joint venture between South Sioux and Dakota City, NE, could bring several new businesses, hundreds of new jobs to the area possibly as soon as 2011. The plans are to put those companies in the Roth Industrial Park, a piece of land split between South Sioux and Dakota City. The development could bring anywhere from 800 to 12-hundred new jobs to the area.

11/25 For many retailers, Black Friday is the biggest shopping day of the season; but this year, things were a little different. Some stores opened so early this year many may have thought it was Black Thursday, as Old Navy opened at Midnight and hundreds flooded in to the store looking for some great deals. Even at Wal-Mart hundreds pored before Midnight on Friday morning.

12/03 The Iowa Wind Energy Association says 80 companies related to the wind energy industry are looking at a lot of growth potential. Right now, about 25 students are enrolled in the wind energy technician program at Western Iowa Tech Community College and to keep up with the industry's growth, the WIT has partnered with the Cherokee Area Economic Development Corporation to bring the program to Cherokee, IA.

12/15 After 19 months, CasinoOmaha near Onawa, IA, reopened its doors. The casino was closed for renovations to meet a series of guidelines set forth by the National Indian gaming commission. Casino management hopes the improvements will help out local businesses with a larger amount of visitors.

3. Economy:

10/13 Wednesday, officials in all 50 states targeted major lenders with allegations that they were repossessing homes without verifying key details, a process called Robo-signing. This is when an agent signs-off on foreclosures without reviewing critical documents.

12/07 A Sioux City bank has foreclosed on the loan a California company used to build the Promenade Theater complex downtown. First National Bank says it "worked diligently" with Civic Partners to restructure the loan over the last 18 months, but, the efforts were unsuccessful. Foreclosure does allow First National to get a hold of the title to the building, and try to sell it to another company.

12/08 After Terra Headquarters in downtown Sioux City was bought out by C-F industries in April; a few months later, in July, many employee's discovered their positions would be terminated as C-F begins out-sourcing jobs to their other corporate offices. On Wednesday, over twenty different employers and a handful of universities came out to Western Iowa Tech, who sponsored a job fair for the once Terra employees and the general public.

12/09 Sioux City leaders are still confident a plan to bring as many as 500 new jobs to town will happen. The state has provided more than a half million dollars in aid and Sioux City is chipping in with land and infrastructure improvements hoping to lure wind blade manufacturer, TPI composites to Southbridge Industrial Park. Even though leaders haven't broken ground yet, they're still hopeful the project will turn out.

1216 A government agency continues its struggle to keep up with a changing economy and the shift to e-mail. The U-S Postal service says it lost nearly \$8.5 billion dollars and 100-thousand jobs. Now the USPS will be closing one of its post offices in Yankton, South Dakota.

4. Local Government/Community Concerns:

10/04 On Monday, Woodbury County Treasurer hopefuls Mike Clayton and Katie Colling met and spoke to members of the Rotary Club. They used the time to talk about and listen to some issues facing Woodbury County residents.

10/07 Chet Culver and Terry Branstad met again, Thursday night, for the second of three televised debates. When the candidates held the first debate, in Sioux City, some viewers had to wonder if either man would stop slinging mud long enough to answer the panelists questions. Thursday's debate gave the candidates another chance to tell Iowans what they'd do if elected. Culver trails Branstad by 19 points.

10/21 On Thursday, Chet Culver and Terry Branstad met for the third, and final, gubernatorial debate in Des Moines, IA. Many expected conflict from the two men running for Iowa's governor's seat; but the format made the debate more about policy rather than politics.

10/22 Friday morning, former U.S. Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich spoke to a group of supporters in Sioux City, IA. In his speech, the Republican discussed the importance of job creation for the nation and says this November election is one of the most important in American history.

10/25 Monday, former Pennsylvania Senator Rick Santorum made a stop in Sioux Center, IA, for a "Road to 51" fundraiser. The fundraiser was hosted by Iowa House Representative Dwayne Alonsin in hopes to make the Republican Party a majority in the Iowa House.

10/26 Two rallies in Sioux City, Tuesday morning, were held with two very different objectives. One group wants to retain Iowa Supreme Court justices Baker, Streit, and Ternus; while the other saying the three judges ruling, which overturned Iowa's ban on gay marriage, was out of their legal bounds and the justices need to go.

11/02 Voters all over the country were at the polls, Tuesday, casting their votes. In Iowa voters will choose who will be Iowa's governor and they will also decide which faces will appear in congress and in the state legislature.

11/03 After the elections on Tuesday, voters in Iowa removed three judges from the Iowa Supreme Court, something that has never been done in the state. Some feel the move may affect the principals of judges in the future while others are just trying to sort everything out.

11/04 The mid-term election will mean a lot of change across the country with Republicans taking the seats of some Democrats and some first-time candidates will replace veteran lawmakers. The story is not so different for Thurston County, NE; a woman has been elected for County Sheriff, a job that has been dominated by men.

11/30 At a news conference Tuesday, Governor-Elect Terry Branstad announced that Siouxland Chamber of Commerce President Debi Durham will be the new head of Iowa's Economic Development department. Durham wasn't sure about when she might leave the Siouxland Chamber, but she'll juggle both positions until mid-January.

12/02 In a Thursday afternoon news conference, Governor Dave Heineman named Dave Bloomfield, a northeast Nebraska farmer, and retired truck driver, to fill a vacant seat in the state Legislature. Bloomfield, of Hoskins, NE, will fill the vacant seat in the legislature which covers Dakota, Dixon and Wayne Counties. Heineman interviewed eight candidates for the spot.

12/20 Iowa's governor elect Terry Branstad spoke with dozens of Siouxlanders Monday, at Sioux City's Public Library, about how he plans to keep his campaign promises. The governor-elect says he wants to be out with the public before he starts his term in office next month. His visit in Sioux City was just one of many scheduled around the state.

12/21 The Missouri River Historical Development, or MRHD, holds the gambling license for Sioux City's Argosy Casino; but some Sioux City leaders say the group isn't following its own rules. In the group's bylaws, MRHD is required to have two representatives from the Sioux City City Council served on their Board of Directors; however MRHD holds their meetings during the same time as council. This and other concerns will be brought up at MRHD's January 3rd meeting.

12/31 After Iowa Governor Chet Culver lost his bid for re-election to Republican Gov.-elect Terry Branstad; he announced that he will go on a farewell tour. The two-day tour will start on Wednesday, January 5th, with stops in Council Bluffs, Sioux City, Mason City and Dubuque. It will continue on Thursday with stops in Davenport, Iowa City, Cedar Rapids and Des Moines.

5. Infrastructure:

10/15 Sioux City's City Council is looking at renewing the contract between the Sioux City Transit System and South Sioux. The new agreement would provide more bus stops in South Sioux and bring in more money for Sioux City.

11/30 A proposed roundabout that would replace the traffic lights where highways 77 and 35 meet in the in Dakota County, NE is drawing opposition from residents and county officials. The county commission plans to write a letter of opposition to the state.

12/13 Sioux City has voted to pass a revised snow removal ordinance Monday night. It's now illegal for residents to park in Priority One Emergency Snow Routes, marked with these blue snowflakes, during a snow emergency. The changes allow the city to fine and even tow cars parked along those routes during snow emergencies.

12/23 Work has started on the Indian Hills/Outer Drive junction. The need for stop lights at the intersection came as response to the increase in traffic thanks to the completion of the Outer Drive Bridge. Officials say there won't be much progress at the intersection for the next 18 weeks, until the stop light poles are ordered. The project is set to wrap up sometime in March.

6. Crime Prevention/Gangs/Violence:

10/05 The man and woman accused in the death of two-month-old Abrieana René Mace, of South Sioux City, NE both pled not guilty Tuesday morning. 35-year-old Lorenzo Guzman and 24-year-old Nicole Ramirez are both charged with one count of child abuse resulting in death. Guzman's trial is set for November 16th, and Ramirez November 18th.

10/08 Sioux City's National Meth Training Center has been around for 13 years, but after closing for six months in 2007, financing continues to be an issue. The center depends on annual federal grants to train officers and for 2011 they have been able to get \$800-thousand dollars worth of funding. The money will be used to train at least 500 new officers next year.

11/01 A Dakota County district court judge will consider whether to restart the sentencing phase for Melecio Camacho-De Jesus, the Mexican national convicted of murdering a 3-year-old South Sioux City girl in her home last year while her family slept. During the first part of the sentencing phase of his trial, jurors found there were aggravating circumstances that warrant the death penalty; a hearing on the request is set for next week.

11/08 Last week, a bomb threat was called into West Monona's superintendent's office prompting the evacuation of all West Monona school. Authorities have revealed that four Siouxland students were behind the threat. The four females used a cell phone to call in the threat from inside the school. The juveniles were arrested and charged with "Threat of Terrorism" and if convicted, the suspects face up to five years in prison. No bomb was ever found.

12/06 On January 1st, 2011, a new Iowa law will aim to standardize the process for folks to get a permit to carry concealed weapons. Many of the laws in place will remain unchanged, but if someone has a clean background, they'll be qualified to carry handguns in the state of Iowa.

12/14 Police in Cedar County, NE, are searching for an armed bank robber. The state patrol says that a man carrying a handgun approached a teller just after nine Tuesday morning and demanded money. The suspect made off with an unknown amount of money from the teller drawers and bank vault; then forced the four bank employees in the vault and fled the scene.

12/17 Authorities in Eagle, NE, say a gunman walked into the American Exchange Bank, Thursday afternoon, and gave a note to a teller. The robber had a handgun and warned tellers not to push their alarm buttons. The man got away on foot with an undisclosed amount of cash.

12/27 A stabbing in Norfolk, NE Sunday has left one dead and authorities searching for another. Norfolk police say the stabbing happened around 1:40 Sunday morning and Monday morning an arrest warrant was issued for 21-year old De'Aris Trice of Norfolk. The victim, 27-year old Timothy Warren, Junior of Norfolk was transferred to a local hospital where he was pronounced dead around 5 am Monday morning.

12/30 Authorities in Madison County Nebraska say De'Aris Trice, who is wanted for 2nd degree murder in the stabbing death of another man earlier this week, was brought into custody Thursday. Trice is currently in being held in a Chicago area jail, and if he waives extradition could be back in Madison County as early as next week.

7. Need for Recreations & Cultural Activities:

10/28 Briar Cliff hosted its first Tour and Treat on Thursday, inviting 50 students from Everett, Smith, and Sacred Heart schools to the campus. Kids got to go through a haunted tunnel, get some candy and even learn some campus history, all in an effort to show young students how fun college can be.

10/29 Friday, second graders at Mater Dei dressed up as saints and gave presentations about what the saints did. Students and family members gave the second graders pennies because an old tradition says this allows the saints to come alive.

11/11 For kids at Covington Elementary School in South Sioux City, NE, Thursday was a day to celebrate money raised for the Siouxland Freedom Park. The school raised more than \$3,000 dollars in less than a month during the Great Covington Penny Push and they presented a check to area veterans during their celebration of Veterans Day.

11/17 Local college students were doing their part to help raise awareness about hunger and homelessness. Students asked folks to "Cram the Van" with food and other items for the Wayne Food Pantry and Goldenrod Hills Community Action Agency. People dropped off donations at Pamida grocery store in Wayne, NE, on Wednesday.

8. Minority/Ethnic Concerns:

11/05 Friday, 14 immigrants in Sioux City, IA, completed the long and strenuous process to become a naturalized United States citizen. To be a legal, permanent resident of the U-S, they need to have proof they have spent the majority of the last five years in the country, be considered of good, moral character, pass a civics test, be able to read and write English, and they need to pay a 675 dollar application fee up front when filing to become a citizen.

11/24 Wednesday a group of Siouxlanders held the 8th annual "Memorial March to Honor Lost Children". The march started at the Marina Inn in South Sioux City Nebraska, continued across the Veteran's Memorial Bridge to the Woodbury County Courthouse and Trospers-Hoyt building in downtown Sioux City.

12/10 A bill called the Dream Act could pave the way to U.S. citizenship for thousands of young illegal immigrants. The bill is aimed at those immigrants brought to the U-S before the age of 16. If they have been in America for five years and graduated from high school, or have a GED; they could gain legal status if they joined the military or attended college. The act passed Wednesday in the House, but the Senate deferred voting until next week.

9. Education:

10/13 Wednesday, Wayne State College's School of Education and Counseling held their annual elementary leadership conference, where students learned about the seriousness of bullying through this and various activities. This year, the school teamed up with the Region

Ill Principal's Association and Haven House, a non-profit organization that provides services to children who have undergone domestic violence and sexual assault.

10/14 The freshman mentoring program at Sioux City's North High, provides an environment for freshman to learn ways to succeed in school as they transition to high school. Upperclassmen, along with teachers, share their experiences to help freshman make that transition.

10/28 Thursday, students from Sioux City high schools cast their ballots for governor, senator, and state Representative in a mock election. In the days leading up to the mock vote, students outlined the candidates' platforms in announcements on the school p-a system.

11/04 High school students and staff at Gehlen Catholic in Le Mars spent Thursday raking leaves and washing windows for their annual fall service day. School staff says students felt it was important to give back, because the community helps support the school with financial donations and attendance at school events.

11/15 Dr. Bill Path, President of Northeast Community College and Curt Frye, Interim President Wayne State College spoke at the Downtown Sioux City Rotary Club, Monday, about a unique partnership between two schools to serve students in Siouxland. Path says the new campus in South Sioux City, NE, will offer classes from both Wayne State and NECC.

11/29 Back in February, Kissinger was closed down, after a vote by the Le Mars Community School district's board; but in the last few weeks the city of Merrill, IA, has bought Kissinger Elementary for one dollar and plan to renovate it into the Kissinger Community Center. The center will house all of the city's offices, library and the police department.

12/14 For the 14th year, there's a decline of students attending Iowa public school statewide. Sioux City's certified enrollment comes is 13,824; down 48 students from last year.

12/29 When Clay Central Everlys' superintendent Monte Montgomery stepped down it prompted the school to request a full financial audit of the district from the state. It turns out that Montgomery was using the school's charge card as his personal bank account. Now the district has been told they can't borrow anymore, and they have to pay back what they owe; if they don't pay it back, they'll lose their state funding.

10. Other:

10/01 Friday, firefighters from Sioux City held a ceremony in memory of the past firefighters who gave their lives in the line of duty. Sunday kicks off National Fire Prevention Week.

10/06 The flooding and high winds that hit Siouxland this summer, is leaving an imprint many are still recovering from. To help with restoration costs FEMA set up mobile centers in a number of Iowa towns to help those affected by the summer storms between June 1st and August 31st. Those with summer storm damage in those counties have until next Wednesday to apply for FEMA assistance.

10/11 This year's soybean crop caught some farmers off guard with yields 10 to 15 bushels an acre. Now, with farmers moving on to combining the corn and local elevators are finding they have to put some of the grain on the ground.

11/09 Tires, Tires, Tires has been named the 2010 top shop winner, and the best tire dealer in North America. Last week, owners Dan and Dale Northdurft accepted the award at a trade show in Las Vegas.

11/16 With the start of the holiday season a little over a week away, many are thinking of being with family and friends. While Triple-A predicts a travel increase of more than 11-percent compared to last year; for about 94-percent of people traveling at least 50 miles away and by car, rising gas prices will be on their minds.

11/19 In July of 2009, a devastating fire at St. Joseph Catholic Church in Sioux City caused the roof to collapse into the building, but most of the interior damage came from water and smoke. Friday, folks gathered for a ribbon cutting to celebrate the church officially reopening.

11/23 After receiving the Medal of Honor in Washington, D.C., Army Staff Sergeant Salvatore Guinta received a hero's welcome back home in Iowa, Tuesday. The day was named in his honor and during a ceremony; the 25 year old was given an encased Iowa flag. Staff Sergeant Guinta stepped into the line of fire to help two wounded comrades on the battlefield in Afghanistan.

11/25 Anyone was invited, not just mission residents, to the Sioux City's Gospel Mission's annual dinner on Thursday. They served more than 200 people to a traditional turkey dinner and dessert. The mission serves the poor in the community, and relies heavily on volunteers to help get everything done.

12/22 Students and faculty at Clark Elementary School collected perishable foods and winter clothing this holiday season for the Siouxland Soup Kitchen. All the items brought in were placed in front the school's "giving tree" and on Wednesday, Clark's 5th graders dropped off their donations.

12/24 Even though most were done with their Christmas shopping; the Southern Hills Mall helped some procrastinating shoppers finish just in the nick of time.

12/24 Across much of the Midwest, the price of farmland is on the rise. The highest increases were seen in Iowa at 13%, with the price of an acre of land selling for 7 thousand dollars or more in some areas of the state. Nebraska and South Dakota have also seen increases in the price for farmland.
